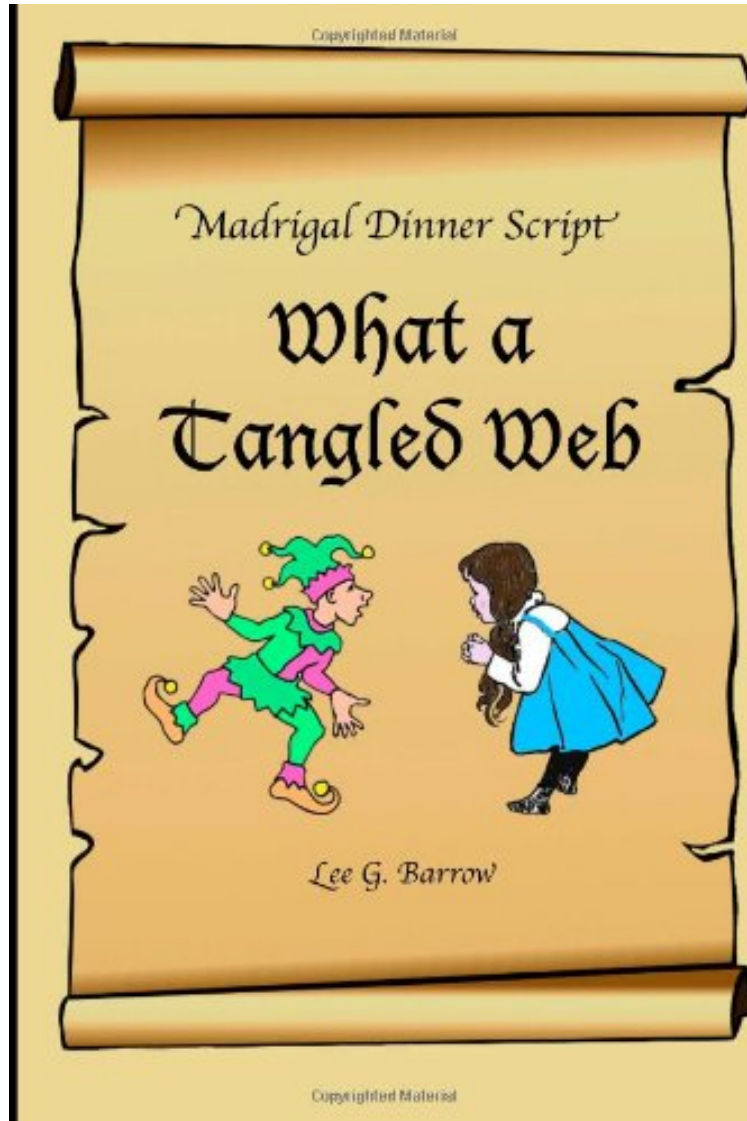

describe it as "Shakespeare finds the internet by way of Oz". Dorothy Com (but you can call her Dot) and her companions are on a quest to find the "World-Wide Wizard". They make a "compaq" to stay together and cross a "dell" to get to a "gateway" . . . well, you get the idea. The Tangled Web was the perfect comic relief to the decidedly pompous nature of the "feast" which preceded it. Oh, btw the script was well-written and easy to work with. Yes, it's a little silly, and it has some modern references, but it went over well, so much so that we were asked to do it again (which we will). It alternates between serious and silly, and there are many puns. The story line is clever. It's not for kids, but it worked well at the high school level -- we only changed one line. I recommend it!

With a mix of regal pageantry and modern parody, this Christmas Madrigal Dinner includes many ceremonial festivities such as the entrance of the Yule Log, lighting of the candles, serving of the Wassail, toasts, and the Official Oath of Fealty and Faith to the Virtues and Vanities of the Yuletyde. Interspersed with these events are ceremonial music, madrigal and Christmas concerts, and several short humorous scenes where the Lord and Lady deal with the loss of the head serving wench. After dessert, the proceedings are interrupted by the arrival of an unexpected lost visitor. In a farcical takeoff which mixes The Wizard of Oz with modern technology, Dorothy Dot Com begins a quest to find the World Wide Wizard so that she may return to her home, Page. Along the way she encounters a web of friends, including PewterMan and the Seedy Ram. The fun flies fast and furiously during this preposterously punny parody.
