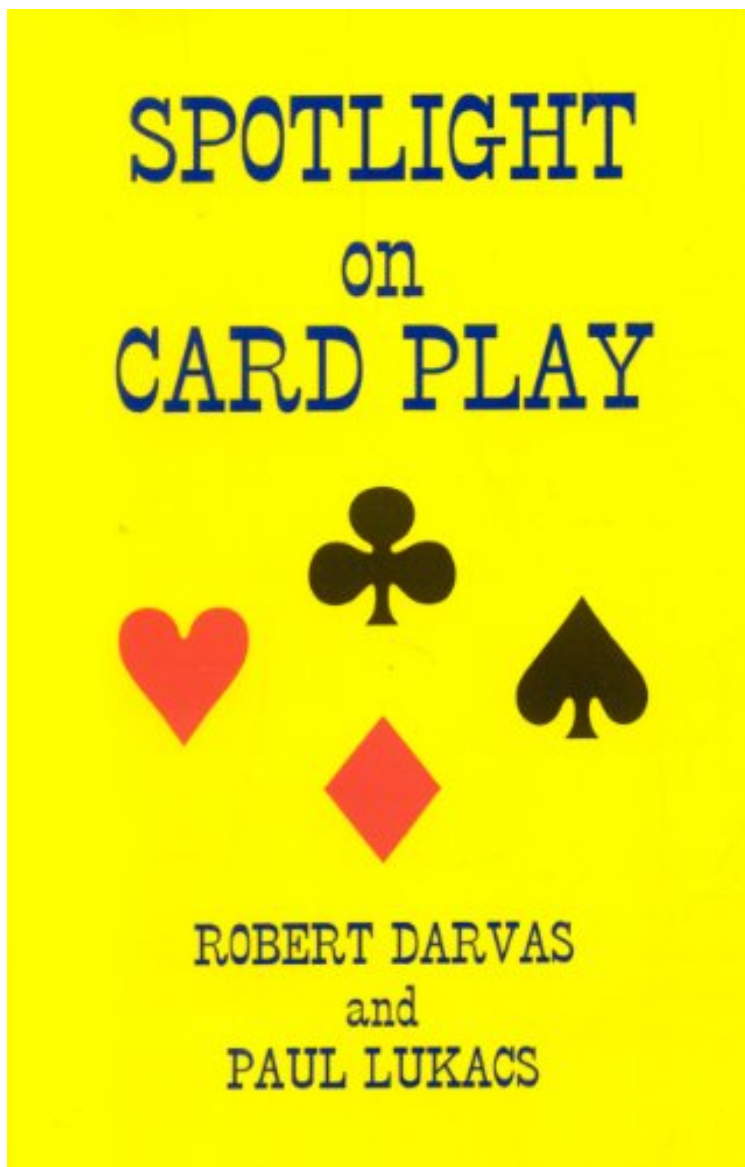

are declarer play. You are shown only dummy and you hand, and are given the bidding and the first card or first few tricks and asked what to do. To answer the question you must: 1. use the bidding and play to place unseen honor cards 2. use the bidding and play to determine the defenders hand patterns 3. visualize what is going to happen later in the play There are a few squeezes, but most problems don't require advanced technique. Based on your choice you will be presented alternative card plays and asked how to deal with them. The hands are not straight forward as they require some thought about the significance of what you discover. You may have to play for dropping the king 4-1 because you don't have enough entries or pushers to pick it up onside.
