By Noah K Mullette-Gillman I was uncertain about spending so much on this book. But I'm really glad I kept my pre-order. It arrived today from TRIPLE-boxed. At 21 pounds, it really needed that! More than 1400 frames between the two books, and they really tell a story. If you'd never seen the movies, you could read this like a graphic novel and you would understand the whole wordless story. The frame choices are evocative. I found myself "hearing" aunt Beru calling for Luke, hearing Boss Nass's spitting noises. The choices of frames were phenomenal. And it was apparently a truly monumental task to create this book. Lucas began working on it in 2005! He could have given us another movie or two with all of the work which went into this. The first 4 movies were all shot on film. Episodes 2+3 were recorded digitally. As a result, they look very different when examined as single frames. They look like paintings or heavy ink work. But this is apparently accurate. These are essentially the raw frames - no airbrush or editing. What you see is what you would see on a theatre screen. I measure each page as 12"x 13.5". There are two frames per page. Since I was a kid I've wanted to hold Star Wars in my hands. I wanted to be able to stare at the images which raced by my eyes. It led to buying lots of toys. But, maybe this book is what I really wanted all along. Now I can just

stare and drink it all in. Here's the bottom line: If you like Star Wars, this is the only Star Wars book you've ever needed. It's not background or expanded adventures. It IS Star Wars. It's huge, it's so heavy it's unwieldy and requires a flat table to open it while maintaining its pristine condition, and if you want to keep it looking new for years, you MUST handle it with the care of a book you would peruse in the rare books section of the Library of Congress. Turn the pages SLOWLY to make sure you don't tear them in your excitement. This type of book requires cast iron discipline to avoid going hog wild and damaging it. Teach kids to wash their hands, dry thoroughly, and use extreme care while viewing. This is your chance to inculcate timeless values of handling antique books properly. I use white cotton gloves (you can buy them inexpensively by the 100 on the net for use in handling pricey antiques and extremely rare antique books). At the very least, wash your hands and dry them thoroughly before use! One smudge and you're toast. If you think about it, few of these books will ever survive in 100% pristine condition, because the photos are so beautiful on extra thick glossy archival stock that many will be sold as "used" in the future (with projected ratings from "Fair" to "VG" condition, with few in "Fine" condition, and hardly any in "New" condition). Those who treat it like kids in a candy store will pay dearly in resale value later. This book is so perfect in every way it will bring tears to your eyes. You can't go wrong. George Lucas must have considered this a "loss leader" for his Star Wars franchise, giving back to the fans, because this should sell for almost \$500 at retail (not to give Disney any ideas!). You even might want to get a beautiful wood dictionary table stand, and open this book to the middle, to display it in your home library. Personally, if I did this, I would make a custom Plexiglas box to set over it as a display cover on the stand, to prevent dust from accumulating on it. I would also wrap the clam-shell box in saran-wrap and store in a safe place NEVER in a garage where heat, cold and humidity will warp it.

This landmark production, perhaps the most ambitious radio project ever attempted, began when Star Wars creator George Lucas donated the story rights to an NPR affiliate. Writer Brian Daley adapted the film's highly visual script to the special demands and unique possibilities of radio, creating a more richly textured tale with greater emphasis on character development. Director John Madden guided a splendid cast including Mark Hamill and Anthony Daniels, reprising their film roles as Luke Skywalker and the persnickety robot See Threepio through an intense 10-day dialogue recording session.
